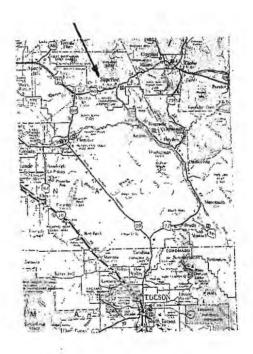

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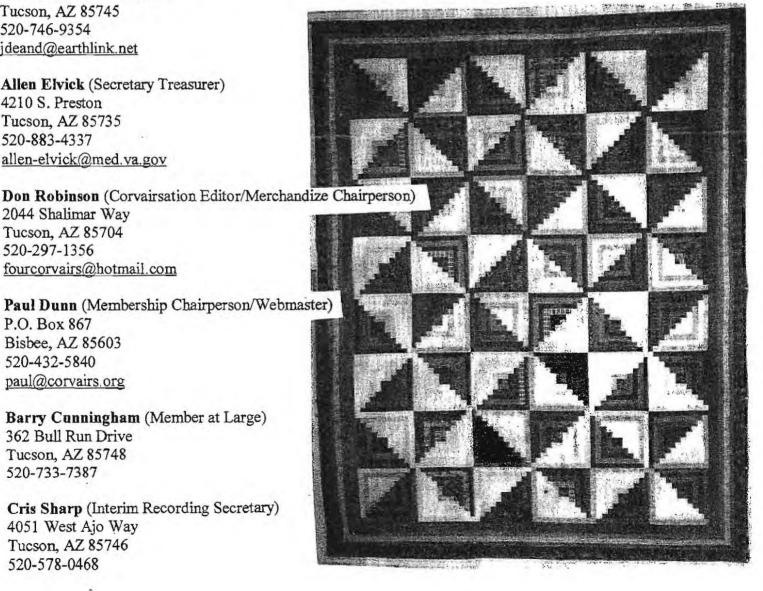

#### 1963 CHEVROLET CORVAIR

For the Corvair, 1963 was a mark-time year. Following the increased success of the previous year, Chevrolet chose to let well enough alone. The model lineup was again modified slightly. The station wagon was gone completely, apparently due to the appearance of the Chevy II wagon and the decided buyer trend toward sporty Corvairs and away from the mundane, work-a-day versions. The Loadside truck also went away, although the Rampside, the Corvan and the Greenbrier were still there.

Although '63 was a year Chevrolet opted to let the Corvair coast along, there were a few minor alterations to set the new year's models apart from the 1962 versions.

The nose got a single narrow chrome strip filled with black running from headlight to headlight, and the turn signal lenses were amber instead of clear. There was anew Corvair name badge in the upper left of the nose panel, and again there were new name badges for the 500 and 700 series placed in front of the front wheels. The rocker panel trim on the 700 was narrower than that on the Monza.

The Monza sedan had front buckets as standard equipment, and all Monzas got a new tufted upholstery design on both seats and door panels. The Monza's interior came in a choice of seven colors. The 500 and 700 series interiors were basically unchanged, although patterns were altered a bit.

The Spyder option was reduced to just \$327 which probably accounted for 1963 being that option's biggest sales year. The sintered metallic brakes and heavy-duty suspension were optional instead of standard.

Although '63 was a year for precious little change in the Corvair, it was also the year Chevrolet chose to reveal the dramatically new and different Corvair show cars, the Monza GT and SS, and Bertone unveiled its Corvair-based Testudo.

In yet another effort to squeeze more mpg out of the Corvair - an attempt to continue to woo those economy-minded buyers-there was an almost unknown 3.08:1 axle ratio available for the 102-hp four-speed Corvair. On the Mobilgas Economy Run a Corvair with the 3.08 scored 27.9 mpg, a formidable feat, but of little notice to Corvair buyers who were flocking to the performance Monzas – nearly eighty percent of the total production run were Monzas.

But something was amiss in Corvair land. Sales were off dramatically. Without a doubt the introduction of the Chevy II cannibalized some Corvair sales. All along, there had continued to be some basic consumer reluctance to such a radically different automobile. The Chevy II with its familiar look-alike styling and its front-engine/rear-drive layout, offered those reluctant folks a ready alternative. The Corvair's rather dismal fuel economy history and its decided trend toward sporty had become an even greater impetus for some to go to the comfortably familiar Chevy II.

By 1963 Chevrolet had played out its Corvair hand. There was nothing left to do, short of a major restyle, and that, although planned, wasn't to be ready for two more model years. The turbo and the sportification of the Monza were Chevy's hole cards. The 1963 relied on the inertia established by the '62, but that wasn't enough to keep the sales figures up.

The car magazines continued their love affair with the Corvair, however, albeit tempered through familiarity. The blush was off the rose by the fourth model year, and the road testers were a little more prone to criticisms that had been downplayed, or not realized, during the early days. Specifically, they called attention to the great improvement in handling and the suspension, to the detriment of the standard setup.

Car and Driver typified the basic setup as "every-now-and-then-you-almost-catch-up-to-it," and Motor Trend said "Rear-end sway was very pronounced at all speeds, and above 50 mph it was intolerable if not downright dangerous, running the factory recommended tire pressures." Still the Corvair was easily the best thing around for the low-budget enthusiast.

Car and Driver again: "Where else can you buy a four-seater that will break 100 mph, do 0-60 in less than 12 seconds, have all-independent suspension, four-speed synchromesh gearbox, American-car luxury, and reasonable handling for under \$3000." Where, indeed?

But the handling deficiencies the car magazines alluded to were becoming more than mere annoyances to enthusiasts. The specter of lawsuits alleging inherently unstable handling was beginning to crop up. In fact, the first such had been filed as early as 1961, and during 1963 more were added. Not only was Chevrolet faced with a dramatic drop in sales to 281,539 the 1963 units, it had a whole new problem with which to contend.

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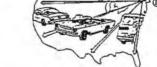
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
