DECODE: Just needs a complete restoration.


CODE: Garaged for the past 40 years.

It seems that the car made a terrible rattling noise when driven and it didn't matter whether the car was at a stand still or going down the road, it still made the terrible noise. He asked if he would have to take the engine out to remove the head and check it out.

There are a ton of little procedures and tricks that we Corvair owners take for granted that the rest of the world doesn't have to deal with when they work on their cars. For example, do you lift the engine out through the engine cover opening? Do you leave the engine and transaxle together before you do the removal? Should you just undo the ujoints and the transaxle comes right out? And a million other things are not intuitively obvious to a non-Corvair car guy. After our initial conversations, Nick was a little apprehensive and wondered if he should just take it a non-Corvair mechanic since were no real Corvair



guys close by. I reminded him that a good mechanic for a "normal" car is hard to find much less somebody who could fix a Corvair and have it work when he was done. Nick decided to give it a go.



Over the next couple of days we had email conversations about everything from axle removal to cold valve adjustments. And, oh, by the way, Nick wanted to have everything back together by the upcoming weekend so he could take to the auction. I thought to myself, here's a guy who doesn't know much about Corvair mechanics undertaking a major project by himself with only email supervision and he wants to be done in 4 or 5 days? What's he smoking?

Well, the email flew back and forth and parts flew from vendors to Nick's house and to my total surprise, I received an email on that weekend that the car was running and shifting fine with no broken starters and no nasty noises and he's on his way to the auction.

For a guy who wasn't too sure of himself a few days before, he really did well. I was, needless to say, quite amazed! It sold at the auction for \$7,000. Now that he's done and the convertible is gone, I'm thinking Nick has been bit by the bug and will soon be thinking about a Corvair for himself!

It was very enjoyable helping a non-Corvair person figure out the little thing that most of us take for granted.
