# **Gordon Cauble Goes Home**

An important piece of TCA history has left us. Our beloved friend and fellow Corvair enthusiasts Gordon Cauble has died on December 3, 2009 in Virginia Beach, Virginia.

Gordon was one of the founding fathers of the Tucson Corvair Association back in 1975. He and Frank McKenna were chatting in the parking lot of an auto parts store about the possibilities of there being a Corvair club in Tucson and from that conversation TCA was born.

Gordon served as club president and editor of the Corvairsation as well as in many other area of the club's organization. He made sure that every Corvair he was familiar with had the opportunity of being in good running condition by keeping a healthy stock of Corvair parts, both new and used, ready for service on the shelves of his garage. Not only was he the ulimate Corvair enthusiast but he was also a friend to many.

Last year the Bryan Lynch Award, which is an award given to the person that did most for the club that year, was renamed the Gordon Cauble Award with its first recipient being March Tucker who received it shortly before her tragic death.

To us Gordon was just a good man man with a big heart who was always able to help when we needed parts or advice for keeping our old cars looking and running good. To the rest of the world Gordon was a different man. Here's what Bill Hess of the *Sierra Vista Herald* had to say:

"FORT HUACHUCA — A former deputy commanding general of the Army Strategic Communications Command on the post in 1967 who had set up the first Signal Corps network on Omaha Beach on D-Day in 1944 has died.

Retired Brig. Gen. Gordon B. Cauble, a veteran of World War II, the Korean War and the Vietnam War, served as the No. 2 leader of STRATCOM in the late 1960s.

As a lieutenant colonel, he went ashore in Normandy on D-Day, June 6, 1944, with the 29th Division as its signal officer.

Of that time, Cauble stated in a history of the Signal Corps that communications on Omaha Beach were a nightmare because many of the Signal Corps soldiers who could lay wire did not get ashore as planned.

"It was D plus 2 before we really got our planned communications systems established," he said in the history, noting by D plus 5, "wire communications was excellent."

Later as the push got off the Normandy beaches, Cauble was wounded in action near St. Lo in France.

In 1979, he was one of 170 retired generals and admirals who signed an open letter to President Jimmy Carter that was published in The New York Times, and other newspapers expressing concerns that America's armed forces and national defense was being short-changed in light of then-growing threats to include new military equipment being fielded by the Soviet Union.

Of the late general, Maj. Gen. Susan Lawrence, commander of the Network Enterprise Technology Command/9th Signal Command (Army), of which STRATCOM was a forerunner, said his service "during World War II, Korea and Vietnam shows his unwavering dedication to this country and strong commitment for the freedom we all hold dear."

As a Signal Corps officer and former deputy commander of STRATCOM, "the initiatives and efforts General Cauble put into place during his time here were instrumental in ensuring our national security during the Cold War and beyond," said Lawrence, who also expressed her personal and NETCOM's condolences to his family "in their time of grief."

Betty Olson, who recently retired after more than half a century as a civil service secretary on Fort Huachuca, remembers Cauble.

Of him, she said, "He was the first general I worked for in 1967. He was a wonderful and fine gentleman."

Cauble was born in Birmingham, Ala., on Feb. 15, 1917. He graduated from high school in Bessemer, Ala., and went on to receive a bachelor's degree in mechanical engineering from Georgia Tech and a master's in business administration from Harvard University.

He was commissioned a second lieutenant on July 20, 1940.

The 92-year-old Cauble, who called Tucson home for many years, was active in church activities and the Rotary and was a founding member and past president of the Tucson Corvair Club.

He was preceded in death by his first wife of 51 years, Vernette. He is survived by his second wife, Suzanne, four children, nine grandchildren and four great-grandchildren.

Retired Brig. Gen. Gordon B. Cauble's military decorations include three Legions of Merit, a Bronze Star Medal, a Purple Heart Medal and two Joint Service Commendation Medals."

All of us knew Gordon as a humble General in the military but he never mentioned or talked about the extent of service he rendered our country.

God Speed, Gordon Cauble.
