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

Brake Spring Washer Tools


One of the most frustrating parts of the brake projects for me is removing and replacing the braked spring washers (the ones shown in the photo to the right). In the February 2017 issue of the Fanbelt Flyer (newsletter of the Cactus Corvair Club), David Dean did a nice article about that very headache.

I have always used a small Vise Grip to grab onto the outer edge of the washer and give it a twist while holding back of the pin with a finger. The stars have to be aligned perfectly, but it does work. It turns out there are at least three tools that can be used for these troublesome washers.


Dave bought two of them, the Craftsman and the OEM Tools brake spring washer tools and discussed them in his review. The Craftsman was his favorite.

The Craftsman part number 47767 seems to be currently unavailable. Usual price is around \$12 or \$13. I was able to locate one on EBay used for \$20 with free shipping. The OEM Tools part number 25056 seems to be available for around \$12 from several suppliers. Another tool that is available is the Lisle part number 47400 that sells anywhere from \$6 to \$10 and looks to function much like the others.

So, if you're in the mood to do a brake job and need an extra tool to play with any one of these three might be just the thing to get your wife for her next birthday!
