

THE CORVAIR: NEITHER GONE NOR FORGOTTEN

"I love my Corvairs, all seven of them!"

Ralph Nodwell of Edmond, Oklahoma, was doing some last-minute polishing on his sparking white 1960 Corvair 700 Club Coupe, one of more than 500 Corvairs waiting to be judged at the 10th Annual Corvair Society of America (CORSA) Convention last summer at the General Motors Technical Center in Warren, Michigan.

At events like these, there's always time to put aside the polishing cloth for a moment to talk about Corvair, the car that has not been forgotten by a legion of loyal and dedicated enthusiasts. Nodwell calls the Corvair "a distinctive car. easy to work on and an awful lot of fun to drive." Like Nodwell, many Corvair owners aren't content with owning just one. Mark Zimmerli of Bluffton, Ohio, for instance, has 10 of them.

Reflecting collector interest in the Corvair, CORSA has become one of the largest single-make car clubs. The organization boasts over 6,500 members in 90 chapter clubs throughout the United States

and Canada. CORSA members receive a monthly publication offering information on club events, restoration tips, and Corvair-related news. The **CORSA National Convention** is held annually-this year's will be held in August in Atlanta-and consists of a judged concours, slalom course runs, road rallys, technical seminars, and various social and organizational activities

What is it about the Corvair that is so alluring to collectors today? Robert Welch of Oklahoma City, who became interested in the car about 10 years ago, says it's "because it's different. It's exciting. What other car offers fourwheel independent suspension, a rear-mounted six-cylinder engine, and feels like a sports car?" John Harrison, a Maryland owner of a 1966 Corsa agrees: "I've owned 10 or 12 over the years. I especially like the styling."

Introduced 20 years ago by Chevrolet, more than 1.8 million Corvairs were sold before production ended in 1969. Although the Corvair was available in a multitude of body styles and models, it was the luxurious Monza coupe that really caught the public's

fancy. With its special trim, plush bucket seat interior, and an optional floor-mounted 4-speed manual transmission, the Monza was a unique combination of small car sportiness and big car comfort.



Their 150-horsepower Turbo-Air six-cylinder engine was an early, and successful, attempt to combine performance with efficiency. The turbo-charged engine option was carried on with the 1965-66 Corsa sport models and these cars also command premium prices.

Other variations on the basic Corvair theme include the station wagons and the convertibles. Corvair wagons were produced in 1961 and 1962 only. They are hard to find today. The Monza convertible was introduced midway through the 1962 model year and remained in the Corvair lineup through 1969 Any convertible Corvair is sought after by collectors but the 1969 Monza ragtop is particularly elusive. Only 521 of




Over 100,000 Monzas were sold in its first full year on the market.

them were manufactured.

As intriguing as it is, the Corvair phenomenon is only part of America's growing fascination with older cars. It's a reflection of a new mood. These cars, fugitives from our past, are recapturing a bit of lost youth for many Americans. As a hobby, it has cut across all age barriers. "Collectible" automobiles today can range from a 1903 curved dash Olds or mid-'30s Duesenberg all the way to a 1971 Camaro Z-28. In fact, the most rapid growth in the old car hobby has taken place among the post-World War II generation of automobiles. These are the cars that contemporary America remembers. Inside the garage of many a collector sits a car 'just like the one Dad used to






