Simple Nut Cake

The whole family will go nuts over this easy-to-prepare, deliciously moist cake.

30 minutes provided in the second sec 30 minutes preparation,

Makes 16 servings

- 访 cup finely chopped almonds (about 2 ounces)
- 2 cups all-purpose flour
- 1/2 cup granulated sugar
- 2 teaspoons baking powder
- 14 teaspoon salt
- 1% teaspoon ground nutmeg
- 1% cups milk
- cup (1 stick) butter, softened 16
- 2 tablespoons heavy cream
- 1% teaspoon vanilla extract

- 2 large eggs cups chopped walnuts (about 1%
 - 6 ounces)

1 Preheat oven to 350° F. Grease a 9-inch tube pan. Press almonds onto inside of pan.

2 Mix together flour, sugar, baking powder, salt, and nutmeg.

3 Mix together milk, butter, cream, and vanilla.

4 At low speed, beat milk mixture into flour mixture. Add eggs, 1 at a time, beating well after each addition. Stir in nuts. 5 Pour batter into prepared pan; smooth top.

6 Bake cake until golden and a toothpick inserted near the center comes out clean, 50 minutes. Transfer pan to a wire rack to cool for 10 minutes. Loosen cake by running a metal spatula around sides of pan. Turn out onto rack to cool completely.

Baking Tips If you like, add ¼ cup dark. raisins to this recipe.

Your e-mail was forwarded to me in hopes I could give you some info. I have towed my '65 Corsa 4 speed many thousands of miles and I have towed many more miles with a Honda civic on a tow dolly.

The '65-'69 Corvair weighs about 2600 pounds, which is lighter than most ski boats. Yes, it is air-cooled, but all Corvairs are six cylinder, 164 cubic inches (about 2.7 liters). I know guys who have towed Corvairs all over the place with another Corvair or with a Corvair van. It is not recommended unless you stick to fairly flat terrain or add some additional means of cooling, such as an auxiliary oil cooler. Your Jeep should be okay if it is the 4.0L high output straight six, but you should still add an oil cooler. you didn't say what kind of Jeep (Cherokee, CJ, Wrangler or Grand Cherokee). If it's an automatic, an auxiliary cooler is also a good idea.

I prefer towing with an automatic tow vehicle rather than a manual transmission because I worry about clutch problems. Towing is very hard on clutches, particularly if you aren't a gentle driver.

Is the Corvair an automatic? Most modern automatics can't be towed with the driveshaft connected (or with the rear wheels on the ground) because there is no rear pump in the tranny to circulate the transmission fluid when the torque converter isn't being turned by the engine. The Corvair Powerglide is different. It HAS a rear pump, so the action of the wheels turning drives the pump and lubricates the tranny. This is fortunate, because there is no way to diconnect the driveshafts on a corvair because the rear suspension falls apart. However, although I have towed an automatic Corvair around town a lot, I have always been hesitant to do it on the open road at freeway speeds for long distances. It's supposed to be okay to do, but I guess I just don't feel good about it.

The other half of the towing problem is stopping. I always tow with a pickup truck, which is twice as heavy as the Corvair. Towing with a light vehicle may not provide enough stopping power - the towed car may overpower the tow vehicle in a panic stop.

Also, when towing a vehicle with a towbar, there is no tongue weight to add traction to the rear of the tow vehicle. This can actually be made worse if the towbar slants upward toward the hitch ball (hitch ball higher than the point where the towbar attaches to the Corvair). In this situation, when you apply the brakes, the back of the tow vehicle lifts and the forward force of the tow bar pushes it up even more. This effectively eliminates rear wheel traction and you are trying to stop BOTH vehicles with only the tow vehicle front brakes! I have experienced this when towing with an empty pickup at only 35 mph! I slid right out into the middle of an intersection when the light turned red!

DO NOT use a tow bar which attaches to the bumper and doesn't pivot up and down! Most rental yard tow bars are that kind. They will tear up your bumper the first time you go in or out of a driveway!

The only advantages of towing the Corvair with the front end on a dolly are 1) you don't need to figure out how to attach a tow bar and 2) you don't have to worry about the front wheels turning the wrong direction when you go out of steep driveways (if this happens, just stop and go back and turn the Corvair steering wheel back to the right direction). But the rear wheels will still be on the ground.

I have seen people towing Corvairs backward on a tow dolly, which does save wear and tear on the rear drivetrain. However, you must carefully and accurately tie the steering wheel in the straight ahead position or the car will not track straight behind the tow vehicle and may even sway back and forth, which is dangerous. If it isn't tracking right the first time, stop and fix it right away! Also, increase the tire pressure to minimize side wall deflection.

Oh, by the way, when flat towing, DO NOT tie the steering wheel! It has to be free to turn. Also, whether you are flat towing or using a dolly, be aware that you CANNOT back up. Well maybe you can in a straight line for about 2 feet, but that's it.

Having said all this, I think the BEST way to do this with the least hassle is to borrow a pickup from one friend and a car trailer from another (or rent). There will be other things to worry about, but both cars have a much better chance to avoid abuse.
